year. Breakdown of the judging was: Flags – Superior Plus Rating, Percussion – Superior Plus Rating and overall band – Superior Rating. The band won 2 Grand Champion Awards this season and 21 "Best in Class" awards. The band also achieved 5 overall Superior Ratings in 6 local competitions this fall. The flags were very inexperienced this year with 5 newcomers to the squad but rose to the occasion each time in attaining 5 out of 6 first places. Percussion was also very successful with 5 of 6 first places. The show this year was titled "Strike Up the Band" featuring music from Gershwin. One of the features this year was Brianna Robinson (flag corps) soloing on the song "They Can't Take That Away From Me". Six-Man Football - History & Update

ave you ever heard of six-man football? I hadn't until our last board meeting. It seems that in the late 1930's there were a number of small high schools and colleges throughout the country who opted to use a six-man football team instead of 11-man. This style of football was developed in 1934 by Stephen Epler, Chester (Nebraska) High School Football Coach, as an alternative means for small high schools to field a football team during the Great Depression. By 1938, Texas schools started using this version of football with 55 schools participating that first year. On October 5, 1940, Windham High School in Windham, Ohio defeated Stamford Collegiate of Niagara Falls, Ontario, 39-1 in the first international six-man football game. Jack Pardee, who played in the 1950's at Christoval High School in Texas is the only known six-man player to have played or coached in the NFL.

While similar to the 11-man version, there are a few differences: the field is 80×40 yards; there is a 15 yard distance between the line of scrimmage and a fist down; all six players are eligible receivers; three offensive linemen are required on the line of scrimmage at the start of play; a touchdown is worth 6 points, but a point-after kick (drop-kick or place kick) is worth 2 points and a conversion is worth 1 point; and a field goal is worth 4 points.

ow! Can you imagine watching a six-man football game? You can! Did you know that Texas has over 110 teams and the number keeps increasing. Colorado, Montana, Nebraska, New Mexico, Wyoming, and Canada also have teams. There are even two adult amateur football leagues!

Hornet Football 2009 Summary

This year the Licking Heights football team embarked on another great journey. A senior-led team, the Hornets finished the 2009 campaign with an 8-2 record, and finished third in the MSL-Cardinal Division. Head Coach Darren Waters, in his fifth season coaching the Hornets, improved his record at Licking Heights to 33-19. Behind the Senior offensive line of Sean Duprae, Austin Williams, Trayvon Ware, Alex Kielmeyer, and Nick Lewis, Senior running back Dan Pennington rushed for close to 2,000 yards this season. Senior quarterback Cody Bailey also played a successful role in leading the Hornets' air attack of Senior Zack Gunn, Senior Nick Rubbo, Junior Ty Stallings, and Junior Jordan Bodell. Defensively the Hornets were led by Senior Edwin Kamara, Senior Colt Denig, and Junior Tevyn Young. Junior Kicker Kevin Carr served as an Xfactor for the Hornets kicking game that proved to be a significant role in the Hornets scoring and field position battles. The 2009 Hornets seniors amassed a successful 30-12 record over their four year span. In that span, the Hornets were able to claim the title of Battle for Broad Street Championship three years in a row, outscoring their cross town rival Warriors 111-38 in their wins. The 2009 team outscored their opponents 353 to 120, outscoring their opponents an average of 35 to 12.
